We are seeing increased cases of bullying through social media channels throughout school communities nationally. It is hard to believe this is happening at primary school level and can be so difficult for the children that become targets of this. Many of our pupils may have asked for various IT devices as Christmas presents. We would ask that you pay particular attention to the Digital Age of Consent in Ireland. The information below may be of benefit to you.

What is the age of digital consent in Ireland? In Ireland, the age of digital consent has been set at 16, meaning that for every child under that age, online service providers (e.g. a social media platform like Tik-Tok or SnapChat) that rely on consent as the legal basis for processing must obtain the consent of the child's parents in order to offer online services to them.

Is it really a big deal if I lie about my child's age

YES. IT IS A BIG DEAL

Signup ages for online services are never advisory. If a social media platform has a signup age of 16, this means that there are **identified** risks to using that service for children under that age. For their own safety, children shouldn't be allowed to use it. If you help your child sneak onto these services, you may be exposing them to danger. The risks from using an age-restricted online service are open-ended. Your child could continue to use that service every day for months or years. For all these reasons, you should never allow or help your child to make inappropriate use of an age-restricted online service. It doesn't matter how benign the service may seem or how close your child is to the permitted age. At the end of the day, these rules exist to keep your child safe.

School Open Day

On Saturday 15th February we will open school to the public. We invite all members of the community to call in and look around our school. - Our staff will be on yard supervision from 8:45am each morning. Please note your child should *not* be on the school yard before this time as they will be unsupervised and will not be covered by school insurance.
- Please make sure you sign your child out on the Aladdin App if they need to leave school early for an appointment.
- Breakfast Club allows pupils to be dropped to school from 8am where pupils are given their breakfast before school starts each morning.
